## Getting Around Beamish

- Trams and period buses operate in a continuous loop around the museum site, which is approximately one and a half miles.
- There are a variety of ground surfaces, some of which are uneven by nature, and there are steep slopes in places.
- Walking distances are approximately as follows:
  - Entrance to Pockerley tram stop: 0.2 miles
  - Entrance to 1950s welfare hall: 0.5 miles
  - Entrance to 1900s Town: 0.7 miles
  - Entrance to Pit Village: 0.2 miles
  - Entrance to 1940s Farm tram stop: 0.3 miles
  - Entrance to Fairground: 0.6 miles

## Accessibility

- Free wheelchair hire is available from the Entrance Building on a first come, first served basis.
- We operate an Easy Access Bus. This is available on call and is solely available for those who require additional assistance, including the wheelchair lift at the rear of the vehicle.
- Visitors can hire motorised scooters for a £12 charge and a refundable £25 deposit. To book a mobility scooter please visit our website. Please note, we are unable to accommodate motorised scooters on any of our period vehicles.
- A quiet space is available in our 1950s welfare hall for any visitor who needs to use it. The room is sensory-friendly and is equipped with a washbasin, chair, sensory-friendly lights and toys and books. Please speak to a member of staff in the 1950s welfare hall for access to the room.
- Assistance dogs are allowed into all buildings, exhibits and catering areas.

## Catering and Retail

- There are plenty of opportunities for you to enjoy delicious food and drink throughout the museum. From our famous fish and chips to our tasty treats in the bakery, you'll be guaranteed to find something to tickle your taste buds! - If you want to take home a reminder of your visit, you can purchase unique Beamish souvenirs from a number of period exhibits and shops on site. Please see overleaf for details on where our retail opportunities are located.

## Dogs

- Well-behaved dogs are welcome in the outdoor areas of the museum, but there are restrictions on the indoor spaces they can access. For the protection of our historic museum collections, **dogs are only permitted in the following indoor exhibit spaces:** Pockerley Waggonway and Great Shed, 1900s Colliery Yard including engine shed and lamp cabin (excluding drift mine), Rowley Station, Sun Inn pub, Entrance Building. **Dog-friendly catering areas are as follows:** Coffee Pot Café, Sun Inn pub, 1950s bowling pavilion (grab and go only), Sinkers' Bait Cabin (grab and go only), Drivers Tavern.
- Please keep your dog on a short lead, accompanied and under control at all times.
- Dogs are allowed on transport at the conductor's discretion.
- Dogs are not permitted at evening events, except for assistance dogs.

## Other Useful Information

- Smoking, including e-cigarettes, is not permitted within the 1820s areas, any exhibit areas, buildings, tram shelters, museum transport or queuing areas. Please be considerate of other visitors if you wish to smoke whilst in the museum.
- Recycling bins are available throughout the museum, please speak to a member of staff to find out more information.
- Beamish welcomes photography for personal use. Please note, the use of tripods, monopods, drones or supplementary lighting is not permitted.
- Please do not feed any animals at the museum.
